I began to think that maybe college wasn't for me. I then entered the workforce and spent three years before realizing that if I was going to work, I wanted to do something I was passionate about.



Since college wasn't a priority in my family, I never truly valued education the way I could have. I had to do most of the research on my own, and I wasn't sure what I wanted to do in life until I had the experience of being in the workforce. That experience made me realize that life can be so much more than a 9-to-5.

The Office of Veterans Services was also a major factor in helping me stay motivated and providing resources that helped me stay ahead and achieve my goals.

As for the future, I hope to combine my passion for history and teaching with traveling."

"I'm a First-Generation college student and I'm from laeger, West Virginia. I spent most of my life on Johnnycake Mountain, which is probably a place most people will never even drive by.

My father and brother did not finish high school. I was taken out of school in first grade and homeschooled since then. I did not get homeschooled through any program, so I never technically graduated from anything accredited. Not having any accreditation was the beginning of my many challenges in my pursuit of attending college.

I originally just wanted to get a decent paying job because my living situation was not the best. I did not have running water or heat, which made winter tough. I did not want to live like that, though. That's when I searched for a job. In my head, my first step was going to get my HiSet, which is basically a high school equivalent. I passed my HiSet test, and the administrator encouraged me to apply for college and follow my passion.

I was not convinced I would perform well, my family told me that I would not make it because I was homeschooled and uneducated. They also made an argument that I would fail financially and would not be able to afford it. I entered DRS, a program to help people that are struggling. Holly Estep, a DRS counselor, told me that my ambition and enthusiasm would get me somewhere if I truly wanted it to, and I truly do.

I really want to work with communities to find sustainable methods in outdoor recreation. I took a course through Yale where I learned about the issues between communities and conservation efforts, and it was like my arrow of passion to work in conservation finally found its target. The immediate goal was Concord, because my boyfriend, now fiancé, had spoken about the great programs available. I took classes at New River Community and Technical College to qualify for Concord.


I did not have a laptop prior to New River, but DRS gave me a computer so I could do schoolwork. They also helped fixed my vehicle in order to have reliable transportation! A lack of good family relations meant getting my information for FAFSA was nearly impossible. FAFSA requires a ton of information, which is very intimidating to someone alone and already anxious. Thankfully, I powered through and got it all filled out in time for the semester to start. After finishing New River, which only had three or four students, I applied to Concord University.

Concord was a very intimidating school for me because it had an actual campus with multiple buildings and professors walked around in business attire. Despite my fear, I was excited to be accepted. Grasping all the new locations, programs, textbooks, and meeting professors, really overwhelmed me at first. However, just explaining how I felt to people at Concord really lessened that overwhelming feeling when I realized just how much Concord faculty wanted me to succeed.

It's very heartwarming to think people believe in me and see what future I am striving for. I'm very grateful for the opportunity to be at Concord, because so many steps had to be taken for this chance. I do not intend to stop moving forward, and I will be forever thankful to the people who convinced me to try."





Hello, my name is Lillian Jones, and I am a First-Generation college student. For the longest time I was embarrassed of my story, but now I am proud. I am proud of the hurdles I have overcome, the sacrifices that were made, the ability to beat another statistic, and not succumbing to all who doubted my abilities to become a better human being.

Being the second oldest of seven children was never an easy task. My grandparents raised each child due to my mother being an alcoholic and drug abuser. By 13 I was in foster care and by 18 I had removed myself from state custody and decided to go to West Liberty. I signed myself back into state custody to qualify for the Chafee program. This program along with being a member of Upward Bound sparked my interest in college and travel. I never wanted to go to college by nature, but after seeing generational poverty, dysfunction, and neglect determine my entire life, I changed my mind. College was never part of the hand I was dealt with, but fortunately with the help of teachers along the way I was guided along a different path. I can attest to education and educators that I would not be a teacher today without the positive influence they had on me.

I went on to get my bachelor's degree in physical education and health. While at West Liberty I faced multiple challenges of being a first-generation college student. I did not have a vehicle and had to get rides from my roommate for the first year. When I was able to get a used vehicle, I had so many issues with it and no help. I worked 3 jobs and had little free time to just be a student and enjoy breaks. During breaks I stayed with friends since we had to leave the dorm. The Chafee program paid for my 4-year tuition and books so that was a major relief. The overall challenge was poor support and no help when something was wrong.

While in the education program my professor asked me if I would be interested in traveling to China. I did a fundraiser to help pay my way, and while there we observed different classroom environments, tried new foods, and went sightseeing in our free time. I viewed these opportunities as a once in a lifetime chance to see the world! Little did I know another opportunity would come for me to teach abroad when I graduated.

When it came time to graduate, I could not work full time and do my student teaching. The dean of the education department then offered me the chance to move in with her. I took the opportunity since I would not be able to graduate otherwise.

In the last semester of school an opportunity arose to teach abroad in South Korea. I looked at this as another chance to travel, meet new people, and make more connections. I was accepted into this program and went on to live in South Korea for two and a half years. I made lifelong friends, had amazing opportunities, and learned how to travel alone.

I moved home after receiving a phone call that my grandmother had passed unexpectedly when I was 26 and, 3 weeks later, my mother passed away from an overdose. After moving home, I found myself always looking for the chance to leave. Years later I realized this is a response to childhood trauma.


I went on to become a flight attendant and worked out of Pittsburgh Airport for the next year in a half. This job gave me the opportunity to travel and work. Unfortunately, it did not pay sufficiently to be able to live comfortably. I went back to subbing and teaching before I would land a permanent job teaching physical education and health. This is my 6th Year in Tyler Consolidated High School and I currently teach 9th and 10th grade health.

After having my two sons and teaching health full time, I was looking for growth in my career and life. I decided to look for a master's program that would work with my busy schedule and family life outside of work. I started Concords Master's program in Health Promotion this year. I realize I cannot do it in the period as most, but slow is better than never. I thrive for change and hope others can see hard things ARE POSSIBLE if you do not give up, work hard to be the best version of yourself, and learn to willingly accept help.

Regardless of what I do I hope to always be the "Person I needed" and a positive role model for the future generations to come."



The first wave of learning how to navigate all the new things that college presented was the most challenging part, initially. Now, the most challenging part really lies within my family. Because my family does not understand my workload, it is hard for them to understand when I have to miss family events for school.


In high school, it was relatively easy to catch up if you had to miss a day. In college, I am scared to miss a day; my family finds it difficult to understand that. They think I am prioritizing school over my family, and this dilemma has caused me to be even more stressed. It honestly puts me in a bad mood when they cannot comprehend it. They have a lot more time to spend with family than I do, and I do not think they even realize how much work I do. Last year, I mentioned a Freshwater Ecology lab to my family, where we analyzed fecal coliforms, and they made a big deal about me "sounding smart." And that day kind of haunts me because fecal coliforms are one of the easiest concepts to understand (out of all that I have learned), and it made me think about how they really do not know all the things I am doing/learning here at the college.

I also pay for my tuition, books, and other materials on my own. My family helps mostly with gas to come back and forth to our house on the weekend. So, the financial aspect is hard as well, especially if you are not prepared for it.

I plan to attend graduate school and become a Wetland Ecologist. Wetlands are very important for the environment to the point where they are governmentally protected; so, I would like to help monitor them and keep them healthy. I eventually would like to become a professor after gaining enough experience and research, because I love teaching and sharing my experiences with others."
